Spring Juried Show

Judge's Statement

The work in the Rowayton Art Center's Spring Show demonstrates the great breadth of creative practice in our area. Standout works included everything from small drawings to sculpture, along with many colorful paintings. From the many pieces that were submitted for consideration I selected the 84 that are now on view and had to make difficult choices to highlight some of the best works on view.

To my eye, figurative works were a particular highlight in this year's show, which featured several exceptional representational pieces. Large abstract paintings were plentiful but a few works – including Roxann Leibenhaut's captivating "3 Girls Swimming" – uses the tools of representation to an expressive end to create a work that is both instantly recognizable and completely in motion. While small in scale, this piece holds its own and I selected it as Best in Show. Other highlights Jennifer Williams's gestural collection of flowers, "Love Story," Ally Rusgrove's self-portrait, "Cat Lady," and Karen Popp's



eerie "Moonrise," which received first, second, and third place, respectively. Because painting dominated the show and my top choices, I tried to round out the honorable mentions by highlighting several exceptional works in other materials, namely photography, which was also well represented among the submissions. As with all selections, it is impossible to single out every deserving work but hopefully these designations are an invitation to look closely at all the work on view.
